I. <u>CALL TO ORDER</u>

Chair Jeremy Moore called the meeting to order at 1:02 PM and noted there was a quorum.

II. OLD BUSINESS

A. Approval of Minutes

The minutes from the March 23, 2023, meeting of the GRADD Hazard Mitigation Council were presented for approval.

A motion was made by Charlie Castlen and seconded by Patsy Mayfield to approve the minutes from March 23, 2022. A vote was taken and the motion carried.

III. NEW BUSINESS

A. Regional Energy Resilience

Amanda LeMaster, Energy Assurance and Efficiency Coordinator with the Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet, shared the goals of the Regional Energy Resilience Mitigation Project. They are to enhance the energy resilience and security of the Commonwealth; to improve community-level planning to maintain a secure energy supply; to establish an energy resilience baseline for backup energy requirements, resources, and fuel plans; and to mitigate the threat of long-term power or fuel disruption and maintain critical community lifelines.

Nick Grinstead, Planning Grants Manager and Program Coordinator with Hazard Mitigation Grants Program Office and the University of Kentucky Martin School of Public Policy and Administration, explained the purpose of the project, which is actually a scoping project. The purpose of conducting a scoping project is to identify future mitigation projects that will result in data collection and analysis intended to increase the capability of and build the capacity for local governments to propose and to complete project applications that either wholly or partially address power and general energy needs and infrastructure needs.

Colie Smith, GRADD Regional Resiliency Coordinator, explained GRADD will complete an energy survey to establish an energy resilience baseline for back-up energy requirements, resources, and fuel plans as GRADD's contribution to the Regional Energy Resilience Mitigation Project. The survey will be sent to emergency managers to be distributed

to critical facilities. GRADD will monitor responses and send weekly status updates to each county. He presented the following timeline for the project:

- 7/19/2023-Meeting #1 Project kickoff
- 7/20/2023-Survey opens
- 8/15/2023-Survey closes
- 9/1/2023-GRADD sends survey data sent to each county emergency manager
- 9/29/2023-Updated county data due back to GRADD
- 10/10/2023-Regional Energy Resilience data set completed
- October 2023-Meeting #2: Prioritization & Mitigation (date TBD)
- February 2024-GRADD Regional Energy Resilience Report Draft
- April 2024-GRADD Regional Energy Resilience Report Complete

Mr. Smith shared the project outcomes would be a regional energy resilience profile for the Office of Energy, county level energy resilience data for emergency managers and governments, and back-up power needs identified for future funding opportunities.
